The board of studies are represented by all the departments and meets twice in a year and discusses on curriculum and its revision and necessary updates suggested are incorporated. Revisions of syllabus are generally undertaken once in three years. The university has introduced CBCS into B.Sc. programmes. The entire syllabi were revised to suit the CBCS and implemented.

- 1. Rural Health Training Centre: The university has started a rural health centre at Devarayasamudra village in Mulbagal taluk and full administrative autonomy granted to department of community medicine. The rural centre provides 24x7 patient care services, specialty clinics, basic clinical laboratory facility, hostel facility and community based health care training for medical and allied health science students and interns.
- 2. Department of Physiotherapy: The department has started integrated M.Sc. Physiotherapy course. A modern physiotherapy centre has been set up in a new building with state of the art facilities.
- 3. R.L. Jalappa Centre for Diabetes and Research: A centre for diabetes has been started in Kolar city to provide comprehensive and affordable diabetes care under one roof and conduct diabetes related training and courses.
